What makes LGBT older adults unique?

Women:

- Higher rates of disability & mental distress
- Higher rates of cardiovascular disease and obesity
- Less likely to have mammograms
- Higher rates of smoking

Men:

- Higher rates of disability & mental distress
- Higher rates of HIV
- Higher rates of smoking

What makes LGBT older adults unique?

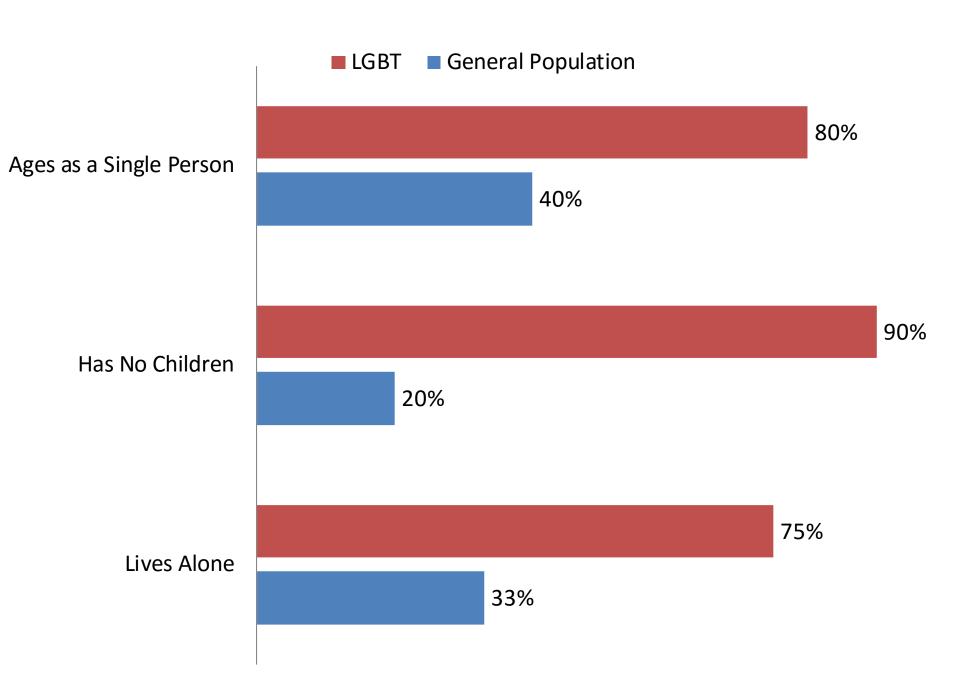
- Nearly 1/3 have a disability
- 1/3 report depression
- Almost 2/3 have been victimized three or more times
- 13% have been denied or received inferior health care
- More than 20% do not disclose their sexual orientation or gender identity to their doctor

A history of discrimination leaves many LGBT older adults with a general distrust of mainstream institutions that many heterosexuals assume are in place to help them.

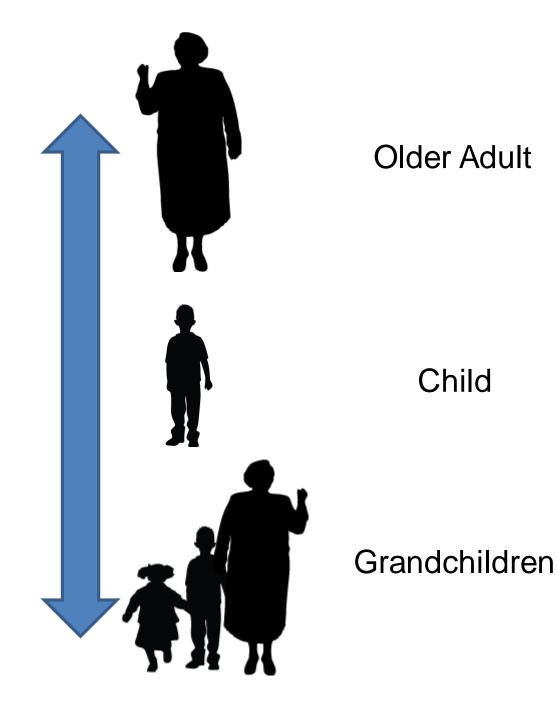
What makes LGBT older adults unique?

Many LGBT older adults live alone and rely on other older adults for support and caregiving.

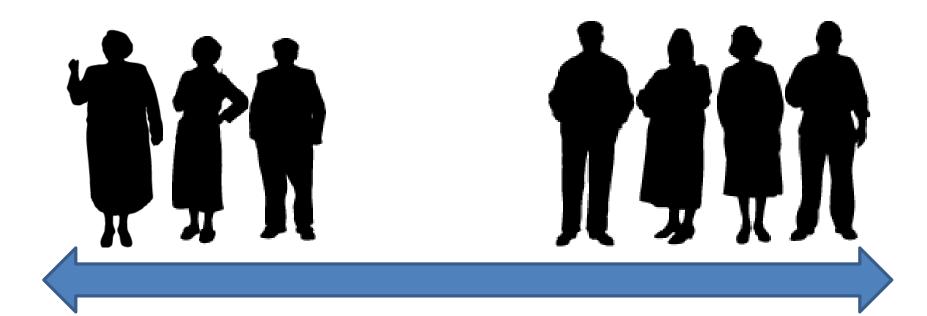
% of Older Adults

Horizontal Caregiving



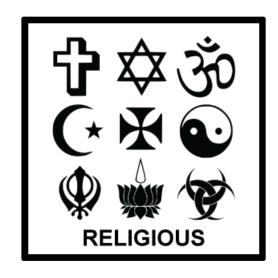

Distrust of Mainstream Institutions











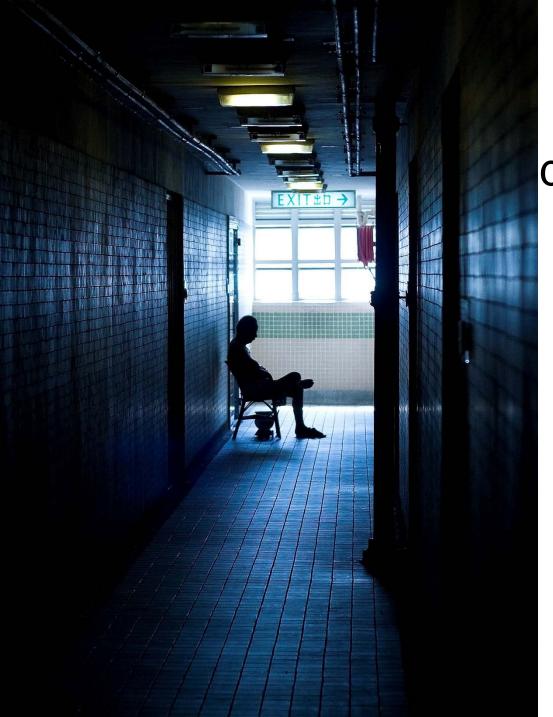


Health Disparities

Coping with discrimination by...

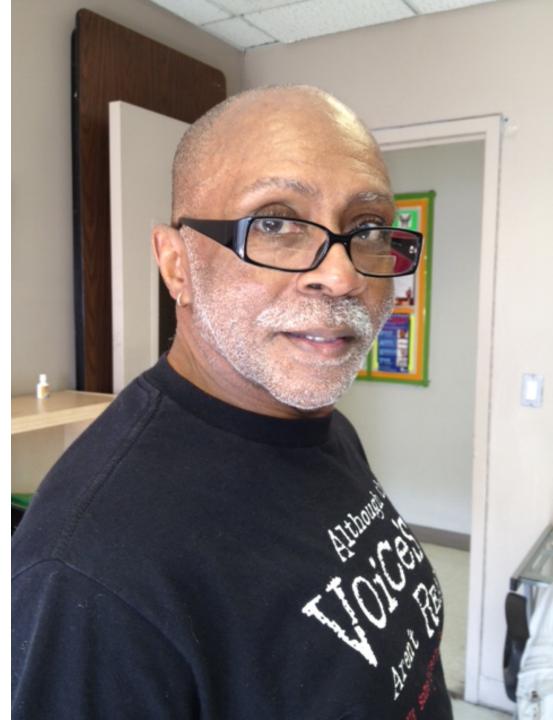
- Becoming invisible or closeted
- Developing strong self-reliance
- Being open with a limited circle of supporters
- Making "home" an important safe-haven

- Queer
- Homosexual
- Lifestyle
- Sexual Preference



Notes on Language

Recognize that these terms evolve.

Be sensitive to preferred terms.

When in doubt, follow their lead!

Best Practices

Individual

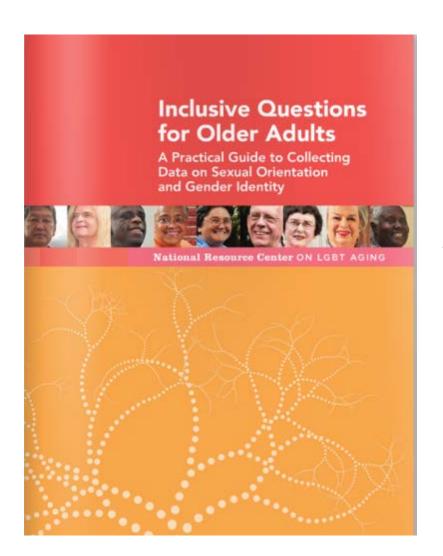
- Don't assume everyone is heterosexual or cisgender
- Expand your definition of family
- Set a tone of respect

Organizational

- Commit to creating an inclusive environment.
- Train your staff.
- Collaborate with LGBT organizations.

Best Practices

- Always use preferred names and pronouns.
- Be clear about confidentiality and privacy policies.
- Change intake forms to ask questions about sexual orientation and gender identity.
- Incorporate photos of LGBT people and symbols (rainbow flag, pink or purple triangles, etc.) into promotional and informational materials, décor, and any programming announcements.
